COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course introduces concepts, tools, software, and a series of guided exercises to support the creative integration of digital media into the foundations of making and understanding visual art. In addition to developing technical proficiency with digital media, emphasis will be placed on visual literacy and critical thinking skills throughout this course. All work (preliminary and final) must be retained for the duration of the semester and beyond as required.

COURSE FORMAT

Digital Media is a studio course. Students will spend much of class time working at the computers on visual/conceptual problems. In addition to studio work, students will be required to actively participate in critique sessions, create and maintain their own Wordpress.com student blog, contribute to various online components, and complete a series of assignments that will take place both within and outside of class time. Students are expected to work productively and collaboratively in the studio setting. At least 5 hours a week outside of scheduled class time should be set aside for Digital Media work.

Grades will be given for *Projects in Units 1-4* and *Digital Portfolios* (these must be posted as a page/gallery on your blog). Mid-term grades will reflect grades for *Projects 1 & 2* and *Digital Portfolio* development. Students are permitted to rework or redo assignments to be included in their final *Portfolios* for which a grade will be given. *Project 1-4* grades will not be changed. Students can expect late work to be lowered by one letter grade (10%) and must be submitted within 1 week of the original deadline or you will receive an F for that Project grade. Attendance may impact grades significantly.

ATTENDANCE

Classes are conducted on the premise that regular attendance is expected. If students anticipate an absence, they should consult with the instructor individually whenever possible. In the event the absence was due to illness or injury, verification from the medical professional treating the illness or injury should be presented to the instructor. It is the policy of Kent State University's School of Art that final grades be lowered by one letter grade (10%) after three unexcused absences. Additionally, three late arrivals are to be recorded as one unexcused absence and arriving later than twenty minutes to any one class will be recorded as an unexcused absence. Absences and late arrivals will be excused only as is appropriate. More than five absences is cause for failure of the course. Failure to attend the Final is cause for failure of the course.

REQUIRED MATERIALS

Students are not required to purchase a textbook or software. We may utilize the online text "Digital Foundations" along with a variety of supplemental content made available on the course blog and http://lynda.kent.edu/. Students will have accesss to the Computer Lab outside of class time. Additionally, there are digital labs in the KSU library.

COURSE STRUCTURE: (Assignments may change as additional resources become available in the newly built CVA building)

Weeks 1-4: MANIPULATION – Photoshop + Wordpress.com + Digital Photography

Introduction to software. Learning to use scanners and shoot work in the digital photolab. Learning to use Photoshop for basic image editing. Learning the importance of web presence and designing blog/web sites to better focus on content/work, achieve an aesthetic that is representative of the artist, improve viewer usability and navigation. Adopting Common Review Standards of blog/portfolio presentation.

Weeks 5-8: ADVANCED MANIPULATION & EXPERIMENTATION – Output methods

Continuation of Photoshop with an emphasis on using non-destructive layers to create hybrid images and prepare them for web (cropping, straightening, perspective correct, distortion correct, exposure) and printing. Researching contemporary artists. Learning to print on the large format Epson and combining digital and hand skills.

Weeks 9-12: VECTORS AND VINYL—Oh my!

Color theory for digital imaging. Using Illustrator to create vector graphics and printing on the large format Epson. Using the vinyl cutter in the ARTech Studio to create a site-specific artwork.

Weeks 13-16: NARRATIVE - Time-based

Learn basic video editing using pro software. Consider how duration and observable transformation can impact imagery. Students will be required to demonstrate independent learning. Results of this project should demonstrate a cumulative comprehension of the various applications of the digital skills and foundational knowledge covered.
